Project Description

The Edward Byrne Memorial Justice Assistance Grant Program (JAG) allows states and units of local government, including tribes, to support a broad range of activities to prevent and control crime based on their own state and local needs and conditions. Grant funds can be used for state and local initiatives, technical assistance, training, personnel, equipment, supplies, contractual support, and information systems for criminal justice, including for any one or more of the following purpose areas: 1) law enforcement programs; 2) prosecution and court programs; 3) prevention and education programs; 4) corrections and community corrections programs; 5) drug treatment and enforcement programs; 6) planning, evaluation, and technology improvement programs; and 7) crime victim and witness programs (other than compensation). In collaboration with the established drug court, JAG funds will be used to support a gambling suppression program and judicial staff training. NCA/NCF

Jul - Sep 13 The 27th National Conference on Problem Gambling was held July 17-20 at the Doubletree Hotel Seattle Airport in Seattle, Washington. Attendees were welcomed to the city by host Evergreen Council on Problem Gambling for education, training, professional development, networking opportunities and much more. The theme of the conference was Connections: Building Partnerships. There were 515 attendees over the twoday pre-conference workshops and two-day main conference. Attendees traveled from Argentina, Australia, Austria, Canada, Singapore, South Africa, Sweden, the United Kingdom, and the United States. Of those who completed the evaluation, 80% rated the overall conference as "excellent" or "good". Pre-conference workshops were held July 17- 18, the two days prior to the main conference. 13 presentations given by 20 speakers were arranged in a combination of half-day and full day workshops to provide in-depth intensive training. Notable workshops included High Stakes: Suicide & Problem Gambling by Heather Chapman, Ph.D., NCGC II, which reviewed results of a study looking at factors leading to suicidal ideation, comparing individuals with substance use disorders to those with gambling disorders. Dr. Lori Rugle, Ph.D.,

NCGC II and Shirley Hoak discussed the DiGIN program, which seeks to address the impact of gambling on the recoveries of all those in substance abuse or mental health treatment, not just those for whom gambling may be a problem.

Oct - Dec 12 The benefits cannot yet be weighed, but we have assessed candidates for gambling addiction therapy from the drug court client list. Several have agreed to therapy and begun counseling and verification programs.

Jan - Mar 13 staff attended gambling addiction training, assessed clients, have 5 currently and hope to include several more. Detectives performed computer voice stress analysis as part of the protocol and results were forwarded to case workers. The program has a growing number of clients and the assessments are showing that there has been prevention of gambling through intervention.

Apr - Jun 13 Seven participants have been admitted to the program and are undergoing treatment at this time.
